# Dear SPA Family,

From the observation of God's creation, we can notice that the plants have an inherent authenticity. Their beauty pleases our eyes. We've learned to know which are poisonous and which we can consume. If they mislead us, it is not their fault, but the result of our ignorance. And animals are able to pretend, but even when they pretend, they are authentic and real. We can know their nature enough to predict their behavior, although we can sometimes be wrong.

Only we, humans, are the best of all creatures when it comes to pretending, and we may not know who is who. Some of us put others into boxes for the wise and the foolish, the rich and the poor, the good and the



vile, etc. Costumes/uniforms and symbols are also meant to help 'identify' a person. And so, the king puts a crown on his head and holds a scepter. Priests, policemen, soldiers, doormen, chimney sweeps... are wearing uniforms. Different color and style/design keep us from confusing the general with the chimney sweep. A luxury car and an apartment in a good neighborhood or ten earrings in the ears and fewer in the nose are also signs of belonging to the suitable class.

However, **this external marking of a person has nothing to do with his authentic value.** Because this value is so much profound. Thoughts and actions are its manifestation. When someone does not have in his heart, for example, love for his neighbor, even if he learns and implements external forms of showing it, it will still look not authentic, one can sense the falsity in this behavior. Such a man is similar to the king I met in at Navy Pier. He had a crown on his head and was carrying a scepter; he looked like a real king. But he waited in vain for tributes from his 'subjects' who indifferently walked by.

Each religion has its own signs and behavior by which we can identify its followers. Christians have many outward forms by which they express their belonging to Christ. Churches, crosses, paintings, services, processions, rosary in hand, prayer on the knees, and a holy medal around the neck. However, Christ says that this is not the most important identification sign of His followers. *"This is how all will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another,"* says Christ. Love is to be the hallmark of Christians. **The outer signs are very important, but they make sense as long as they are filled with the inner worth, which is love.** 

Last Sunday, we celebrated Mother's Day, so I want to write a few sentences about one of the most beautiful love – mother's love. The beauty of this love is closest to the love that God gives to each of us. **Mother's love takes thousands of shapes in everyday life.** An awakened mother bends over the screaming baby in the middle of the night. She waits anxiously for the late return of her child. She embraces her children in her heart, when others make them feel abandoned. She sheds tears when her baby goes through difficult times in his life. She never stops loving, like God.

# YOUR SUNDAY WORSHIP AID 5th Sunday of Easter

#### **GOSPEL MEDITATION**



I've always found it amazing that Jesus never says to his disciples the straightforward and bumper stickery words "I love you" or "I will always love you" (a la Dolly Parton's song). Why doesn't Jesus say, "I love you"?

Well, actually he does, but in particular ways. He says, "As the Father loves me, so I love you" (John 15:9) thereby rooting his love for us in the space of the Holy Trinity. This week he commands, "Love another as I have loved you" (John 13:34). He presents his love for us as a completed action which continues into the present moment. How has he loved us? By becoming one of us, one with us, and finally giving his life for us in his suffering on the cross. We weren't there when he did that, but neither were his Apostles (except one). Still, that action is his great "I love you" to us.

His love is also hedged in a command: "Love one another." So how can we practically follow it? The great St. John XXIII wrote in his diary that each day he followed this rule: "Only for today, I will do one good deed and not tell anyone about it." The hidden nature of a good deed is a sign that it is truly loving. This week, take on St. John XXIII's practical method of following Jesus' great commandment of love. It's a splendid way to say, "I love you."



- Individuals do not have to wait weeks for a return call or an appointment. Our members reach out quickly and provide not just help but understanding and care.
- We help neighbors as if they are family because we believe they are. They are our brothers and sisters in Christ.
- We are not government funded. All donations come from parishioners of St. Paul the Apostle Church.

#### Recent Case Study-

Alysia is a single young mom of 4. She left an abusive relationship, found a job and a new place to live. Her ex found a way to blackmail her and get her rent money. She had to hire a lawyer to take him to court to take back control of her life. This caused her to get behind in her rent and she called us for help. We were able to help her with her rent payment and she was extremely grateful for this!

\*Most of our cases are people who live paycheck to paycheck. One set back, like missing work for health reasons, or an unexpected expense, causing them to not be able to pay an important bill. SVdP listens to their story and works towards getting them back on track.


St. Rita of Cascia (1381 – 1457) had the opportunity to live her life as a wife, mother, widow, and eventually, member of a religious community.

pressured at a young age into marriage. During her 18-year marriage to a cruel man, she raised two sons. When her husband was killed in a brawl and her sons died, St. Rita decided to go back to her first love and attempted to join the Augustinian nuns in Cascia. Her status as a widow caused some complications to her entering, but she eventually succeeded in professing vows.

Throughout her lifetime, St. Rita of Cascia was known for her prayerfulness and charity. She also experienced stigmata on her forehead, meditated frequently on Christ's passion, and cared for the nuns of her religious community and those in the lay community who came to her for counsel.
