FUNERALS IN THE CATHOLIC CHURCH

The Catholic Church sees the death of a Christian as the end of the earthly pilgrimage and the beginning of a new and eternal life with God. The rites of the Church reflect this belief. The rites of the Church aim to assist the dead with prayers of the Church for their eternal salvation in Jesus Christ and to aid the family and friends of the deceased in their time of loss and sorrow with a message of hope and consolation in Jesus Christ.

The focus of the Catholic Funeral Liturgy is God. The Church praises God for His goodness and for the gifts of life and love which He bestows and are experienced by the deceased. In the Funeral Liturgy, the Church turns to God in faith for the reward of eternal life for those who believe in God and lived for God in this life. The Church also prays to God for the healing and consolation of those who mourn.

The Funeral Liturgy is an aid for both the living and dead. As we gather to pray for our beloved dead we are strengthened and renewed in our faith so that we can recommit ourselves to loving God and living our lives in Jesus Christ.

The Funeral Liturgy is closely tied with the Rites of Baptism when the promise of eternal life in Christ is first given to those who believe. The ritual symbols of water, the paschal candle, the pall, the Word of God and the journey to the altar, all recall the journey that begins for the Catholic in baptism.

For Catholics, the normative celebration of a funeral is the Funeral Mass. The Funeral Mass is always celebrated in the church. A Funeral Liturgy outside of Mass may be celebrated at the funeral home- the rite remains the same with the exception that the Liturgy of the Eucharist is omitted.

Funeral Masses and Cremation, when cremation is chosen, the cremation should take place after the Funeral Mass, the Catholic Church prefers that the body of the deceased be present for the funeral Mass. If cremation is completed beforehand, a Funeral Mass can still be arranged.

Burial of Cremated Remains. The Catholic Church does not allow for the scattering of the cremated remains of the faithful. Cremains are to be treated with the same

respect as the body. The remains are to be interred in the ground or placed in a columbarium.

The Funeral Mass expresses the faith in Jesus' victory over death and our personal share in that resurrection. It does so through prayers and blessings, through songs and readings, through ceremonies and symbols. A few words on some of these may make the liturgy in church more understandable and more consoling.

1) The color of the priest's vestments. We normally associate the color white with Easter, weddings, baptisms and other events of joy, happiness and victory. Since we are not merely grieving over a loved one's loss, but celebrating her or his entrance through death into life forever, the clergy generally wear white vestments. However, current church directives state that "Violet, white or black vestments may be worn at funeral services and at other offices and Masses for the dead in the dioceses of the United States of America".

2) The Easter or paschal candle. For 50 days after Easter the large paschal candle stands in the sanctuary. It symbolizes the risen Christ and tells us he has conquered sin and death and now lives in our midst. In the Catholic funeral service we carry this candle in procession or place it before the casket as a reminder that the deceased, through her or his death, shares in that victory of Jesus over the powers of darkness.

3) Sprinkling of the casket. We first share in the resurrection of the Lord through baptism. At the font, saving waters poured over our bodies made us Christians and our whole beings new creations filled with the Holy Spirit. When the priest sprinkles holy water over the casket during the service it should serve to recall that initial washing in baptism. It is this which gives us the basis for hope in the personal rising of loved ones to life forever.

4) Placing of the Pall. A funeral pall, reminding us of the garment given at baptism and therefore symbolizing our life in Christ, is draped over the coffin at the beginning of the liturgy. Family members or friends are encouraged to do this, although the placing of the pall may likewise be done by the priest or another minister of the service. The use of this pall also signifies that all are equal in the eyes of God (Jas 2:1-9).

5) Presentation of Gifts. The church encourages family members or friends at the Funeral Mass to bring to the altar the bread and wine. This action in effect says, "Lord, we give our loved one back to you. We accept your will. We know it is some event in your plan."

6) Holy Communion. This is the most perfect way to share in the Funeral Mass. The church encourages Catholic Christians to do so. You may also receive communion under both kinds. The words of Jesus in St. John have great meaning here. "Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood has life eternal, and I will raise him on the last day" (Jn 6:54).

7) Incensing of the body. As Christians we believe the body is a temple of the Holy Spirit and one day will be resurrected by God's mighty power. During the Funeral Mass, the priest walks around the casket and incenses the body as a sign of our respect for the remains, as a symbol of the community's prayers for the deceased rising to the throne of God, and as a final farewell or commendation of this departed one to God.

8) Planning with the parish ministers a personal funeral service. This service contains the rich variety of prayers, readings and ceremonies included in the official Catholic ritual for Christian funerals. That rite also encourages you, working with the presiding priest of the Mass and musicians, to select those which you find most suitable for the circumstances. The meeting with parish ministers will be scheduled with you a few days before the funeral mass. I am sure the funeral director, musicians and parish priest will be most happy to help you with the practical details.

9) Scripture Readings from the Bible. Among the many resources open to you in the funeral liturgy is a list of scriptural readings. At funeral liturgies, there is a reading from the Old Testament followed by a reading from the New Testament as well as the Gospel. The family is invited to choose from among the designated selections of readings. The family may appoint a person to do the First and Second Reading. The Gospel is proclaimed by the priest or deacon.

10) Liturgical Music. The primary purpose of music in any liturgy is to help people pray and worship God. Music plays an important part in the funeral liturgy and adds great beauty and solemnity to the prayers of the Church. Music affects our feelings and the atmosphere in which we pray. It expresses well our inner thoughts. As in the case with all Catholic liturgical assemblies, music during a funeral mass can help focus peoples' attention on their Catholic faith by expressing hopes, beliefs and expressions of faith in a way that the spoken word cannot. The music chosen shall be music written for liturgy. A list of hymns and responsorial psalms is provided in this booklet.

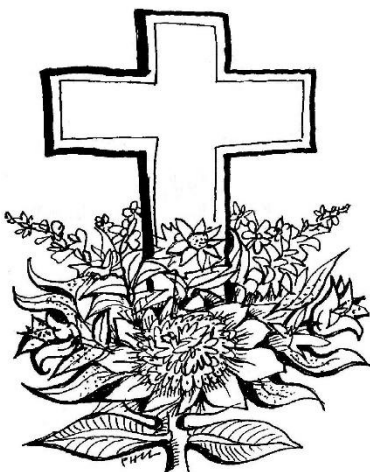
11) Words of Remembrance. After the concluding prayer of the Mass but before the *Prayers of Commendation and Farewell* a family member may share words of remembrance. It is very important for the person giving the words of remembrance to be sensitive to the liturgical tone set by the ritual *Order of Christian Funerals*. A remembrance of the deceased is a way of placing the life of the deceased and the present experience of loss within the context of faith. How was the deceased's life an imitation of Christ? How was he/she a person of sharing healing, helping, feeding, building, teaching, etc.? There are definite religious/theological themes that permeate funerals. These are evident in the prayers of the Mass and in the readings from Scripture. What can be said about how God worked in the life of the deceased? How did the deceased share a unique, holy life with family, friends, church, and community? The Words of Remembrance provide an opportunity to deepen the assembly's faith. What can be said about the deceased that helps or encourages the assembly? Keep in mind that you are participating in the sacred funeral rites of the Church and the sacred funeral rites of a relative or friend. The text of the words of remembrance must be written. The length of the words of remembrance shall not exceed 5 minutes and be delivered by one person. The text of the remembrance should be reviewed by the priest or his delegate. The words of remembrance work very well and may be given at the funeral home. Your funeral director will be happy to assist you.

12) Personalized holy cards and worship aid. If you have the desire, you may wish to prepare more individualized holy cards to be handed out at the Mass, and the funeral director certainly can assist you here. We will prepare the worship aid for you to help your family and friends participate during the service.

13) Funeral Visitation at Church. A visitation may be held at the church prior to the funeral mass (usually one hour before the Mass). During the visitation in the Upper Gathering Space, the following items have been used in recent funerals to express symbolically the main interests, loves and efforts of a deceased person: photos, videos, meaningful personal and religious items of the deceased person.

14) Funeral Luncheon. St. Paul is able to prepare a funeral luncheon for the family of the deceased following a funeral mass and/or graveside service. The Parish has a funeral luncheon ministry and therefore all preparation, food service and cleanup are done by them. Suggested donation will be appreciated. However, you can bring your own food or be catered by an outside company.

15) Final commendation and committal. The last ceremony after Mass and at the cemetery is called a liturgy of final farewell or commendation and committal. In some ways, this is the most difficult time, for it is a final good-bye to one we have loved through life. But again the support of friends and the comfort of faith tell us that it is, and it isn't, final. A separation yes, but only a temporary one. An end, yes, but more, a beginning. The following prayer, one of several which conclude the graveside service, summarizes these thoughts:



Our brother/sister N. has gone to his/her rest
in the peace of Christ.

May the Lord now welcome him/her
to the table of God's children in heaven.
With faith and hope in eternal life,
let us assist him/her with our prayers.

Let us pray to the Lord also for ourselves.
May we who mourn be reunited one day
with our brother/sister;
together may we meet Christ Jesus
when he who is our life appears in glory.

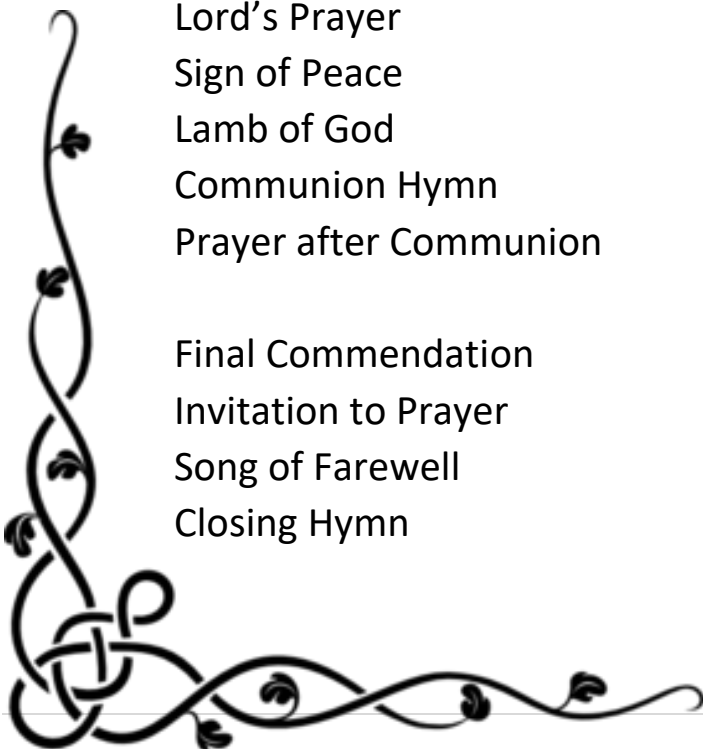

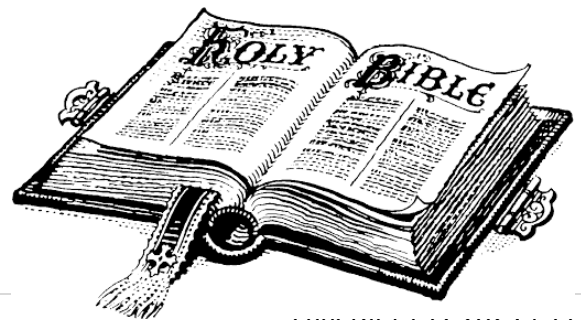
OLD TESTAMENT READINGS

1. Ecclesiastes 3:1-8,11, 14

*(Choose one new Testament Reading for the 2nd Reading)

1. Romans 6: 3-4, 8-9

A Reading from a letter of Paul to the Romans.

Are you unaware that we who were baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death?

We were indeed buried with him

through baptism into death,

so that, just as Christ was raised from the dead

by the glory of the Father, we too might live in newness of life.

If, then, we have died with Christ,

we believe that we shall also live with him.

We know that Christ, raised from the dead, dies no more;

death no longer has power over him.

2. Romans 8: 31b-35, 37-39

A Reading from a letter of Paul to the Romans.

If God is for us, who can be against us?

He who did not spare his own Son but handed him over for us all,

how will he not also give us everything else along with him?

Who will bring a charge against God's chosen ones?

It is God who acquits us. Who will condemn?

It is Christ Jesus who died, rather, was raised,

Everything indeed is for you, so that the grace bestowed in abundance on more and more people may cause the thanksgiving to overflow for the glory of God.

Therefore, we are not discouraged; rather, although our outer self is wasting away, our inner self is being renewed day by day.

For this momentary light affliction is producing for us an eternal weight of glory beyond all comparison, as we look not to what is seen but to what is unseen; for what is seen is transitory, but what is unseen is eternal.

Blessed are you when they insult you and persecute you and utter every kind of evil against you falsely because of me.

2. Matthew 11:25-30

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew.

On one occasion Jesus spoke thus:

"I give praise to you Father, Lord of heaven and earth,

for although you have hidden these things from the wise and learned you have revealed them to the childlike.

Yes, Father, such has been your gracious will.

All things have been handed over to me by my Father.

No one knows the Son except the Father,

and no one knows the Father except the Son

and anyone to whom the Son wishes to reveal him.

"Come to me, all you who labor and are burdened, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am meek and humble of heart; and you will find rest for yourselves. For my yoke is easy and my burden light." The Gospel of the Lord.

3. John 6: 37-40

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John.

Jesus said to the crowd:

"Everything that the Father gives me will come to me, and I will not reject anyone who comes to me, because I came down from heaven not to do my own will but the will of the one who sent me.

And this is the will of the one who sent me, that I should not lose anything of what he gave me, but that I should raise on the last day.

For this is the will of my Father, that everyone who sees the Son and believes in him may have eternal life, and I shall raise him on the last day.

4. John 6: 51-59

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John.

Jesus said to the crowd:

"I am the living bread that came down from heaven; whoever eats this bread will live forever; and the bread that I will give is my flesh for the life of the world."

The Jews quarreled among themselves saying,

"How can this man give us flesh to eat?"

Jesus said to them, "Amen, amen, I say to you, unless you eat the flesh of the Son of Man and drink his blood, you do not have life within you.

Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood has eternal life, and I will raise him up on that last day.

For my flesh is true food, and my blood is true drink.

Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood remains in me and I in him. Just as the living Father has sent me and I have life because of the Father, so also the one who feeds on me will have life because of me. This is the bread that came down from heaven. Unlike your ancestors who ate and still died, whoever eats this bread will live forever." The Gospel of the Lord.

5. John 14: 1-6

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John.

Jesus said to his disciples:

"Do not let your hearts be troubled.

You have faith in God; have faith also in me.

In my Father's house there are many dwelling places.

If there were not,

would I have told you that I am going to prepare a place for you?

And if I go and prepare a place for you,

I will come back again and take you to myself,

so that where I am' you may also be.

Where I am going you know the way.

Thomas said to him,

"Master, we do not know where you are going;

how can we know the way?"

Jesus said to him, "I am the way and the truth and the life.

No one comes to the Father except through me."

Response: Hear our prayer.

Many friends and members of our families have gone before us and await the kingdom. Grant them an everlasting home with your Son. Lord, in your mercy:

Response: Hear our prayer.

Many people die by violence, war and famine each day. Show your mercy to those who suffer so unjustly these sins against your love, and gather them to the eternal kingdom of peace. *Lord, in your mercy:*

Response: Hear our prayer.

Those who trusted in the Lord, now sleep in the Lord. Give refreshment, rest and peace to all whose faith is known to you alone. Lord, in your mercy:

Response: Hear our prayer.

The family and friends of N. _____ seek comfort and consolation. Heal their pain and dispel the darkness and doubt that come from grief. Lord, in your mercy:

Response: Hear our prayer.

We are assembled here in faith and confidence to pray for our brother/sister N. _____. Strengthen our hope so that we may live in the expectation of your Son's coming. Lord, in your mercy:

Response: Hear our prayer.

Set # 2

Priest: *My dear friends, let us join with one another in praying to God, not only for our departed brother/sister, but also for the Church, for peace in the world and for ourselves.*

Reader: That bishops and priests of the Church, and all who preach the Gospel, may be given strength to express in action the Word they proclaim. We pray to the Lord. *Response: Lord, hear our prayer.*

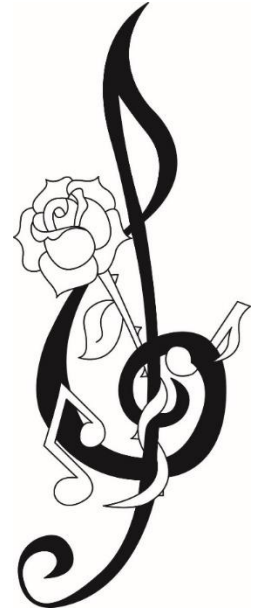

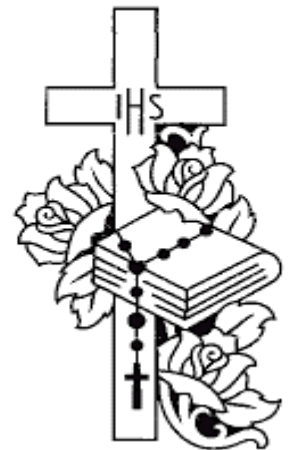

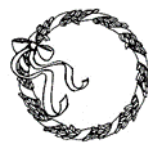
