

Dear SPA Family,

Self-evaluation or evaluation of others – which one is more present in me...? To ensure one's full personality development, a person should verify the decisions made and, consequently, the actions and steps taken to fulfill those decisions. We should be able to see ourselves as we are. As mature people often say, this is the best school of life when life teaches and shapes us. Someone will say, well, surprisingly, this is not a new discovery. Yes, we discover neither 'America' nor anything new with this statement, but as life shows, there is often a discrepancy in our lives between 'to know it' and 'to follow it.'



For this to be possible, a person should first of all be able to look at themselves and evaluate themselves. How does it look today? When observing modern people, one can get the impression that a person lives and observes... but that he observes and lives the life of another person, not his own.

This weekend's Gospel passage, according to Saint Luke, shows us two praying people and two different attitudes accompanying this prayer. Attitudes, but at the same time, how different those two men are looking at each other.

A Pharisee - yes, he prays, talks about himself, but in incredible pride and arrogance, and at the same time assesses the tax collector in relation to himself. Does he really pray and see himself fully before God? Can he see himself as he is?

The tax collector - who does not even look up, stands afar, beats his chest, and utters very simple but true words: "God, have mercy on me, a sinner..." He stands before God in the truth, he calls it as it is without 'beating about the bush.' He speaks truthfully, frankly, and directly about his situation, and he stands before himself and God in truth. He knows who he is... what he is... that he acknowledges his guilt for what he did in his past - but he can face it all as it is, he can regret it, apologize, and most importantly, he wants to change and transform.

These two attitudes from two thousand years ago are still present and current today, where people - as it seems - already know more, understand more, and all should be easier. One thing remains constant, although everything around us changes. The environment and conditions change, but each of us is still a person who has their own life to live with others.

The ability to look at ourselves, to verify our lives, will allow us to live in real life, to truly perceive the reality in which we live; but it will also allow us to perceive and approach other people differently and more humbly. However, if we fulfill the above-mentioned conditions, then our conversations with God, our perception of God will be more true and more fruitful.



YOUR SUNDAY WORSHIP AID

30th Sunday in Ordinary Time

GOSPEL MEDITATION



Every now and then readers of these reflections write letters in which they object to something. Years ago, this Gospel of Luke 18 prompted such an email. A man wrote to me: "I find it deeply offensive that you suggest we are still sinners once we are God's sons and daughters." His objection stirred in me a profound awareness of the paradox at the heart of our faith. Are we sinners or beloved children of God?

In this Gospel (Luke 18:9-14), a tax collector appears as one who has missed the mark. His sins have isolated him. His breast-beating is not an act of self-flagellation for pride's sake but a heartfelt admission of his failure and unworthiness. Remarkably, Jesus honors the candid humility of the parable's penitent. Why? Because we are always in need of mercy, always. But even more, perhaps because on the cross, Jesus will fully embrace a similar place of humiliation and rejection. He will enter into the most shameful, offensive place of the sinner so that we might "go home justified."

There is a sacred tension in admitting that we are sinners and yet have profound hope. We are beloved sons and daughters of God, growing precisely through our honest acceptance of failure. When we cry, "Have mercy on us," during Mass or when we repeat the "Jesus Prayer" in quiet moments, or in the confessional, we embrace our imperfections as fertile ground for divine grace. In doing so, we follow Christ's example — finding true exaltation in the humble acknowledgment of our human frailty.

From now on the crown of righteousness awaits me, which the Lord, the just judge,


will award to me on that day, and not only to me, but to all who have longed for his appearance. At my first defense no one appeared on my behalf, but everyone deserted me.





The Saint Vincent de Paul conference (SVdP) was formed in 2008 in reaction to the growing human needs within our nearby communities of Gurnee, Waukegan, and North Chicago. **Today we share information about how you can help.**

Community needs have grown so great. Our brothers and sisters in the community desperately need us to provide this emergency service. This is not permanent aid. Financial aid is provided so that people can move forward on their own once the emergency has ended. We are their last call for help!

Few of us can imagine that the person standing next to us in any line, or on any corner, might be abused, close to eviction, underemployed, without transportation or utilities, or have children who are hungry. However, it is real. Understandably, community needs have grown exponentially over the years, especially in these times of unprecedented price increases for virtually everything.

Meet Anna,

She is a 53-year-old woman who lost her job with a nonprofit in December 2024. Managing work and Divinity school had always been challenging, however after exhausting her savings, dropping out of school, and unemployment, she was facing a new reality. For the first time in her life there was the possibility of homelessness.

Anna was able to find a factory job working four days a week for ten hours each day. We were able to assist her with her rent which moved her towards future sustainability. She recent wrote to us "...Jesus said the poor are always with us, which resonates deeply with me. It reinforces the reality that we all go through difficult seasons, and it is during these times that compassion and support from organizations like SVdP is invaluable."

Simbang Gabi, meaning "Night Mass" in Filipino, is a cherished nine-day novena of dawn Masses leading up to Christmas Eve. Its roots trace back to 1669, during the Spanish colonization of the Philippines. Spanish friars—primarily Augustinians, Franciscans, Dominicans, and Jesuits—introduced Catholicism to the islands and sought ways to integrate faith into the daily lives of Filipinos.



Recognizing that most Filipinos were farmers who began work before sunrise, the clergy made a practical and pastoral decision: hold Masses at dawn so laborers could attend before heading to the fields. This adaptation gave birth to Simbang Gabi, a tradition that fused faith, agriculture, and community rhythm into one spiritual practice.

The Masses were originally called Misa de Aguinaldo or Misa de Gallo ("Mass of the Rooster"), referencing the early hour when roosters crow. Over time, this novena became a symbol of devotion and anticipation for the birth of Christ.

"The bells rang before the sun rose, and the faithful gathered in candlelit churches—offering their prayers with the dew still on the ground." (Sinaunang Panahon, 2025)

EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP-RECOGNIZE GOD IN YOUR ORDINARY MOMENTS

MORE THAN A BUZZWORD

If you roll your eyes at the mention of the term stewardship, it's probably because, in the modern Church, stewardship has become something of a corporate buzzword. It's often used interchangeably with the concepts of financial endowment and volunteerism.

What's wrong with supporting your parish monetarily? What's the issue with giving of your time in service and ministry? Nothing at all, in fact — we should all be doing more of these things.

But as we do them, we should be constantly asking ourselves the all-important questions: Why am I doing this? How am I doing this? For whom am I doing this?

A donation to the parish school is a great thing. But ideally, the donor would have made the gift regardless of the ability to name the school gym. A tireless volunteer who always finds time for her parish certainly glorifies. God with her commitment. But

hopefully, her commitment would be just as enthusiastic if she knew there was no prospect of being written up in the bulletin as Volunteer of the Month.


God knows no favorites. The prayer of the Pharisee in the temple did not justify him because the Pharisee didn't really mean it as a prayer. His intent wasn't to thank God, his intent was to draw attention to his gifts. God did not reject the Pharisee's fasting and his tithes, he rejected the spirit in which they were offered.



SAINT BIO

St. Gianna Beretta Molla | April 28

St. Gianna Beretta Molla (1922-1962) was born in northern Italy, near Milan. Her parents were both Third Order Franciscans and she was the tenth of 13 children. At just 12 years old Gianna became a member of Catholic Action, a movement which advocated for a more intense spiritual life for Catholic laity. She would continue as a member and leader of the movement her whole life.

In 1942, both of Gianna's parents died, only four months apart. Despite the loss, she continued to be active joining the St. Vincent de Paul Society, serving the elderly and sick. In 1949 Gianna completed her degrees in Medicine and Surgery from the University of Pavia. She opened her own medical office in 1950. Two years later she earned a specialty in pediatrics. While medicine was her calling, she also enjoyed skiing and mountaineering, the theater, the opera, and concerts.

She and Pietro Molla fell in love and were married in September 1955, fulfilling Gianna's vocation. Their first child, Pierluigi, was born the next year. By 1959 they had been blessed with two more children, Maria Zita, and Laura. Gianna was pregnant with her fourth child in 1961 when unusual pains revealed a uterine tumor. She elected to have a surgical procedure to remove the tumor but continued the pregnancy. This was incredibly risky for her at the time, but she insisted that whatever happened to her, the child should be saved. Gianna carried the baby to term, and Gianna Emanuela was born by C-section in April 1962. One week later the saint succumbed to septic peritonitis, giving her life for her daughter's.

Gianna is the first woman doctor and working mom to be canonized. She was beatified by Pope John Paul II on April 24, 1994, and officially canonized on May 16, 2004. St. Gianna Beretta Molla, pray for us!
