

SOMETHING TO THINK ABOUT - HOPE... OUR BEST OPTION!BY MARY PENICH

When I read Luke's gospel about the persistent widow (Luke 18:1-8), I saw myself. Too often, I identify completely with this unwavering soul who simply wanted what was rightfully hers. In his parable, Jesus didn't tell us



parable, Jesus didn't tell us what the widow's issues or circumstances were. Jesus told us only that the widow wanted the judge in her case to end her troubles by ruling in her favor. As for me, I admit that I can't count the times I've looked upward with the

same persistence. My only consolation is that I truly believe that our All-loving Creator hears every word we utter in heaven's direction. The truth is that God knows our every word and understands our every desire even before we speak them.

I'm turning my attention back to our recent visit to Iceland to explain. Though my husband and I were excited to visit this unknown-to-us island country, we were more excited to board the plane that would take us more than 3,200 miles from our troubles here at home. Life in this country of ours has been tough for too many of us. The bickering among us hasn't helped. Like the persistent widow in Luke's gospel, I wanted these troubles to be resolved peacefully and in the best interest of us all –not just an elite few. Though I had no judge to confront with my concerns, I endured a 6 hour flight to find the peace I longed for. Amazingly, as soon as our plane began its ascent through the clouds, my heart overflowed with hope. The vast blue expanse I found above those clouds reminded me that our troubles were a tiny part of God's much larger plans for us all. Suddenly, my need to badger God disappeared in the awesome wonder that surrounded me.

During that flight, though I dozed off for a few minutes here and there, most of the time, I enjoyed the view from our window. The sky faded from



beautiful blue to gray to black. Hours later and after the change in time zones, Iceland's blue sky welcomed us. By the time our plane landed, my weary longing for peace had been transformed. When Mike and I climbed down the stairs from the plane, excited anticipation

replaced my longing. Hope in the wonders to come completely filled me up. Tired as I was. I smiled. The five days that followed indicated that my smile was prophetic. In Iceland, I found everything that I thought I'd lost. Though Iceland's history is punctuated with difficulties, they have emerged a peaceful and productive nation. A positive response

to my persistent prayers seemed possible after all...

I'm quite certain that Jesus shared his story about the persistent widow to encourage us. Jesus wanted to assure us that, however annoying or out of place our prayers may seem, God is listening. No matter how repetitive or insistent our prayers may seem, Jesus and the Heavenly Parent we share attend to every word. Though the results we expect may be adjusted according to THEIR wisdom and love for us, those results will come in just the right way and at just the right time. Do you remember Jesus' plea from the cross, "Why have you forsaken me?" Now, consider what happened just two mornings later! Jesus' prayer was answered perfectly, not only for him, but also for you, for me, and for us all.

As you likely suspect, when Mike and I left the plane that brought us home, I found the troubles that I'd hoped to leave behind intact. The difference is that I realize that I don't face these things alone. I never face my troubles alone. None of us do! Like the persistent widow in Jesus' story, I received the judgment I'd hoped for. Though Iceland's breathtaking terrain was no longer a glance away, reminders of God's peace and God's loving care were just steps away in every direction!

A few days after we returned, I took those steps to the shores of Lake Michigan. Amazingly, that 40-minute walk didn't tire me at all. I was

invigorated by the sound of the waves that welcomed me. When I made my way down the stairs, over rocks and onto the sandy beach, I couldn't believe how much that shore with its rushing waves looked like Iceland's shores. Wow!



Suddenly, this persistent God-nagger realized that God is also persistent! God persists in loving us far more than we can imagine and far more than we'll ever know until we're finally at home with God forever.

So, today, I offer a prayer of thanks for Jesus' parable about that persistent widow. Through this story, Jesus gives me and all of us, not only permission, but also his encouragement, to pray on and on until God answers. The best part of this is that, though we may feel we're going overboard in our requests, it is God who will actually go overboard in every loving response to us!

29th Sunday in Ordinary Time

GOSPEL MEDITATION



A woman in my parish has an adult son who has rejected his faith. She prays for him every day. She lights candles, says rosaries, and asks God again and again to bring him back. But nothing changes. Is God listening? Is He delaying? She told me once that she feels like the widow in Jesus' strange parable — crying out for justice, but hearing only silence. And yet, she said, she is at peace. I asked why. She responded, "God is already answering. I just can't see it yet."

She embodies something of the mystery in Jesus' parable this week in Luke 18. A powerless widow demands justice from a corrupt judge. This isn't about wearing God down until He gives in. It's about faith in the justice that is already coming. The widow isn't just persistent; she believes that justice is inevitable. And when Jesus points to the judge's words — his fear of being "struck" — He hints at something deeper: God's justice does not creep in gradually. It strikes. It comes like lightning.

Blessed Mary is, of course, the ultimate widow demanding justice. At the foot of the cross she stands before what looks like the ultimate injustice — the brutal execution of her son. But she did not despair. She did not beg for a last-minute rescue. She knew that justice was not delayed. In fact, it was happening. The power of the cross was already unleashing justice upon the world — suddenly, decisively, like a blow that would topple every corrupt power, making even the most corrupt fear her strike.

This parable asks us: will the Son of Man find faith on earth? Or will we mistake God's silence for absence? The cross proves that justice is not slow. It is only hidden. The lightning has already struck. In the cross, justice is speedily being done.

You CAN help

The Saint Vincent de Paul conference (SVdP) was formed in 2008 in reaction to the growing human needs within our nearby communities of Gurnee, Waukegan, and North Chicago. **Today we share information about how you can help.**

Community needs have grown so great. Our brothers and sisters in the community desperately need us to provide this emergency service. This is not permanent aid. Financial aid is provided so that people can move forward on their own once the emergency has ended. We are their last call for help!

Few of us can imagine that the person standing next to us in any line, or on any corner, might be abused, close to eviction, underemployed, without transportation or utilities, or have children who are hungry. However, it is real. Understandably, community needs have grown exponentially over the years, especially in these times of unprecedented price increases for virtually everything.

Meet Anna,

She is a 53-year-old woman who lost her job with a nonprofit in December 2024. Managing work and Divinity school had always been challenging, however after exhausting her savings, dropping out of school, and unemployment, she was facing a new reality. For the first time in her life there was the possibility of homelessness.

Anna was able to find a factory job working four days a week for ten hours each day. We were able to assist her with her rent which moved her towards future sustainability. She recent wrote to us "...Jesus said the poor are always with us, which resonates deeply with me. It reinforces the reality that we all go through difficult seasons, and it is during these times that compassion and support from organizations like SVdP is invaluable."

The 2025 Annual Saint Vincent de Paul Appeal will culminate in a




