I clean up after breakfast and then don sweats and a hoodie with sleeves long enough to pull over my hands. The temperature outdoors hasn't reached 50 degrees yet. When I'm certain I'll be warm enough, I head to the sidewalk while Mike drives off to run a quick errand. In 45 minutes, we'll meet at the entrance to the beach to walk along the shoreline together. Afterward, I'll be happy to ride home with him in the warm car. As I begin my walk, it occurs to me that it's mid-November. Less than 50 days remain in Year

While I head east, I consider recent history. So many of us have dealt with uncertainty on numerous levels. Shortened daylight hours immerse us in darkness before many of us return home from work. Uncertainty at workplaces and financial insecurity do the same.

Threats both nearby and far away require us all to take care. Political activity also contributes to unrest. Wounds inflicted by opposing factions sting. It occurs to me that it's time to soothe those wounds with the salve of open minds and open hearts. People who truly want to do the right thing usually find ways to work together. With all of this in mind, I give thanks

for the good in my life. Some recent news has been difficult, and I feel somewhat uneasy. Yes, there are so many things to pray about! As I look upward, a crisp breeze makes its way up my sleeves and sends a chill down my spine. Are you telling me something, Lord?

I walk on beneath the blue sunlit sky. I tell myself, "It's hard to believe that this beautiful sky reigns over our troubles." Many within our human family aren't feeling peace just now. A child in Ukraine tries to ignore the sound of explosions nearby. A child in Gaza wonders if she'll ever have a home again. A child in Ethiopia cries with hunger. Other little ones just a few miles and half a world away do the same. A friend who battles cancer prepares to say, "Good-bye". A lonely heart hopes for love, but with less fervor these

days. One of the working poor wishes only to get by as her struggle with daily expenses continues. How long will she be able to feed her children? Food pantries everywhere serve long lines. *Are you telling me something, Lord*?

As I walk on, I acknowledge the generations who have come and gone under this sky. More will do the same in the years, decades, and perhaps centuries ahead. Joyful days will punctuate human history, just as moments of sadness and despair leave their marks. I consider the tough times that have touched my own life, and a tear forms in my eye. Still, I find reason to feel grateful. Even in my sorrow, I've been blessed, and I will be blessed again. We all will! Yes, Lord, I know!

The strong lake breeze scatters neatly piled leaves as approach. Those leaves swirl high into the air and then nestle on the sidewalk before me. I ask aloud, "Is this where you're meant to be?" As those leaves crunch beneath my feet, it occurs to me that the difficult times in our lives swirl us high into the air as well. Then, when we recover to live on in the aftermath, we find that we are precisely where we're meant to be. Just like those leaves! *Am I getting this right, Lord!*

I catch sight of Mike at the beach entrance. We head down to the shore where we walk the length of the beach three times. I absorb this beautiful place while Mike preserves it in a few photos. We chat as we

walk to the car and drive home, When I finally sit at my desk to write, another chill startles me. "Where is that coming from?" I ask. As I read today's scripture passages, God seems to explain. Malachi and Luke insist that we must never ever lose heart especially when



lose heart, especially when we're tempted to despair. Malachi (3:19-20) reminds us that God promises, "For you who know my name, the sun of justice with its healing rays will rise." Luke (21:5-19) shares a similar promise when he reminds us that Jesus said: "... not a hair on your head will be harmed. Your perseverance will save you." Yes, Lord! Of course!

Finally, I understand! God is telling us that, though we all experience suffering here, we will find peace and joy. This isn't a matter of hope! These promises are reality- the reality God hints at throughout our lives and then brings to fullness in the next. So, we mustn't lose heart! One day, we will bask under the perpetually blue skies of God's love! Dear God, thank you!



GOSPEL MEDITATION



When I was a kid growing up in New England, I'd occasionally go on a whale watch. Once we went out with calm waters and clear skies. But on the way back in, the sea got rough. I was just a kid, and I remember thinking we should turn left or right toward the shoreline I could see. But the pilot of the boat kept going straight — right into the waves — focused on a small, discouragingly distant lighthouse. Even when it flickered in and out of sight, he stayed the course. He knew where he was going.

That image comes to mind when I hear Jesus' words in today's Gospel regarding false messiahs: "Do not follow them" (Luke 21:8). In times of chaos or uncertainty, there are always voices offering easier routes, promising false safety, claiming to speak for God. But Jesus isn't found in the loudest voice or the nearest shoreline. He is steady, like a lighthouse in the storm.

The tribulation of which Jesus speaks — it's real. It happened to the Temple, it happened to him, it happens in the Church, and it will come to each of us. But the command is not to panic. It's to endure. To keep steering toward him. Faith isn't about having all the answers or dodging every wave. It's about knowing where the lighthouse is — and trusting it enough to keep going, especially when false safety beckons us to stop.



Deacon Formation Program

As is noted in the words of the Rite, instituted acolytes "have a special role in the Church's ministry." The Rite notes the following responsibilities:

- Assist priests and deacons in carrying out their ministry at the Eucharist;
- As special ministers, they are to give Holy Communion to the faithful at the liturgy, and to the sick;
- Because they are specially called to this ministry, they should strive to live more fully by the Lord's sacrifice and
 to be molded more perfectly in its likeness;
- They should seek to understand the deep spiritual meaning of what they do so to offer themselves daily to God as spiritual sacrifices acceptable to Him through Jesus Christ.

Regarding the Ministry of Acolyte, Canon Law also notes that newly instituted acolytes must regularly exercise their ministry from this point forward if they are to be considered for the possibility of Holy Orders.

Presently, there are nearly 500 active deacons in the Archdiocese of Chicago.

Please keep Tom, his wife Stacy, and family, and all those in formation and their families, in your prayers that they might continue to answer God's call in their lives. Family, friends, and parishioners are invited to attend the liturgy/institution.

Two Things Can Be True At Once

As my husband and I drove our firstborn child home from the hospital, I sat alongside my daughter in the backseat. Terrified, exhausted, exhilarated, confused, hopeful — I was all of these things at the same time. I gazed at her, this magnificent little creature whose face was both familiar and strange to me, thinking: She is exquisite. She is the future. She is life.

And then I burst into uncontrollable sobs.

"What's wrong?" my husband cried, panicked, glancing in the rearview mirror.

"She's — going — to — die — someday," I blubbered, choking on my own tears.

"Ohhh, honey." I'll never forget the tone of his voice as he clearly debated turning this car around and taking me back to the hospital for an emergency psych evaluation.

"I think you might be tired."

Ten years later, it's a memory we laugh about. I hadn't slept more than four hours in four days. Postpartum hormones had lain waste to my senses. Here, on the threshold of new life, all I could think of was death. It's funny. It's absurd.

But it also makes a lot of sense.

Love and hate. Hope and fear. Joy and sorrow. Death and life. What lasts forever, and what is even now passing away before our eyes. To be human is to know that these feelings, these realities, can and often do occur at the same time. To be Christian is to know that it means something — even if we cannot understand what. Not yet.

In every moment of his earthly life, Christ shows us that two things can be true at once. A virgin is a mother. An exile is a king. The temple will be destroyed, and it will last forever. The world is ending. The world is beginning. The cross is death. The cross is life.

St. Elizabeth of Hungary | Feast Day November 17

Although her life was short, St. Elizabeth of Hungary (1207 – 1231) is recognized for her love of the poor and suffering, and as patroness of Catholic charities and the Secular Franciscan Order. The daughter of the King of Hungary, she chose a life of penance instead of leisure, which made an impact on the "commoners" she served.

St. Elizabeth married Louis of Thuringia when she was 14. Deeply in love, they had three children. Despite their wealth, she led a life of prayer, sacrifice, and service to the poor and sick under the spiritual direction of a Franciscan friar.

After six years of marriage, her husband died in the Crusades, and St. Elizabeth was grief-stricken. Her husband's family did not look kindly upon her and mistreated her before finally throwing her out of the palace. However, the return of her husband's allies from the Crusades resulted in her being reinstated, since her son was legal heir to the throne.

St. Elizabeth joined the Secular Franciscan Order in 1228 where she cared for the poor in a hospital she founded in honor of St. Francis of Assisi. She died in 1231, but her great popularity resulted in her being named a saint only four years later.




