

SOMETHING TO THINK BOUT - EMBRACE GOD'S JOY AND SHARE IT!

My husband and I just returned from a visit with his Aunt Yola. She and Uncle Frank were the first of Mike's extended family whom I met when we began dating. They made me feel that I was part of the family long before Mike proposed marriage. Their warmth and welcome endured through Uncle Frank's passing. Today, Aunt Yola's smile assured me that nothing has changed. Mike and I will always be family to her.

When we returned home, I hung my coat in the foyer closet. That's when I saw the basket of Christmas Cards we received this year. During our visit, Aunt Yola's eyes sparkled as she thanked us for our Christmas card and those our sons and their families had sent her. I understood her joy because I enjoyed reading every card we received. As I closed the closet door, I decided to share in Aunt Yola's joy by revisiting those cards. I took the basket and nestled into the couch next to our Christmas Tree.

As I read the cards, the glow of our Christmas Tree seemed brighter than ever. Though its branches



drooped a bit and a few pine needles had fallen near the Nativity Scene below, eachcard's artwork and greeting revived my Christmas Spirit. Their messages filled me up with hristmas affection for their senders. It didn't take me long to

capture a bit of Aunt Yola's joy and to return to my own Christmas mindset. The peace I felt was simply too tangible to let go.


Though I acknowledged that I would soon remove every trace of Christmas from our Frasier Fir, it occurred to me that Christmas isn't meant to be stowed away like those light strings and ornaments. Christmas is meant to have a lasting effect which carries us through the months and year ahead. At age 95, Aunt Yola has certainly kept Christmas's hope alive in her joyful heart. "How can I do the same?" I wondered. It was then that I turned to this writing and today's message of joyful hope.

The Sundays after the Christmas Season are numbered until the Season of Lent begins. Each week, we will delve more deeply into Jesus' life among us. It seems to me that the more we get to know Jesus, the more eager we become to live as lesus lived. Our visit with Aunt Yola and the time I spent with those Christmas cards gave me a taste of the joy that comes with keeping all that Jesus shared with us in the forefront of my life.

Happy as I am about this, I realize that keeping up this momentum throughout the New Year may be a challenge.

Fortunately, the scripture passages this Second Sunday in Ordinary Time offer the encouragement I need. In the first reading (I Samuel 3:3b-10, 19), a strange voice in the night wakens young Samuel several times. He assumes the voice is his mentor, Eli. Only after Samuel wakes him three times

does Eli explain that it is not he, but God who is calling. It is then that Samuel responds, "Speak, for your servant is listening." I realize that I must listen as well. In the second reading (1 Corinthians 6:13c-15a, 17-20), Paul encourages us to share ourselves with one another. Our presence to those who need us



is the best way to share our joy. Aunt Yola certainly demonstrated this during our visit! Finally, in the gospel (John 1:35-42), John the Baptist sees Jesus and announces, "Behold, the lamb of God." Andrew and his friend hear this. Though they say nothing, they follow closely. When Jesus asks what they're looking for, he invites them into the relationship which changed their lives forever. Our relationships with Jesus change our lives as well!

Perhaps it was no accident that Mike and I visited Aunt Yola today. Perhaps it was no accident that I revisited our Christmas card basket. Perhaps both were meant to occur -like the encounters described in today's scriptures. Jesus transformed his ordinary life as his dad's apprentice and then a rabbi into an extraordinary opportunity to care for those he met along the way. Today, you and I are invited to use our ordinary lives to bring that hope and joy to those we meet along the way.

When we open ourselves to God's presence in our lives, we can't help sharing what we've found. As complicated or mundane as it may be, every moment provides the setting in which we hear and respond to God's call as best we can. When in doubt, simply do as Jesus did with persistence and joy and a little inspiration from Samuel, Paul, and Aunt Yola. With or without a basket of Christmas cards, do what it takes to re-energize, regroup, and begin again!



GOSPEL MEDITATION



As a priest, I'm amazed how happily married couples remember the tiniest details of their earliest encounters. They effortlessly report things like: "he wore a blue shirt," "we ordered brussels sprouts," "her hair was up in a bun," and "he spilled shrimp cocktail sauce at my family's open front door when it was ten degrees below zero," (that one's courtesy of my mom). We delight in remembering and speaking of when our new life of love began. The little details are glorious reminders that it's all *real*.

It's similar for John the Apostle. He tells us of the two disciples who followed Jesus into his house, "...they stayed with him that day. It was about four o'clock in the afternoon." Why does that tiny detail matter? Because that's the time of day when they encountered the love of Jesus the Messiah in their lives. Our religion is not primarily about abstract truths about God, no matter how true or sublime. It is about God meeting and saving us in our human nature. It's about a human relationship. relationship.

What was the time of day when you first recall encountering Christ and his Church? Who was there? What did you feel? How did things look and smell? What happened? Take some time to recall it in detail. For me, it was inside an old, rickety church on a hillside in Jerome, praying, singing, and laughing. When was it for you? Remembering the details isn't empty nostalgia. It reminds us now that God's love for us in our humanity is real.




WOMEN'S FELLOWSHIP

When this happens, there may be feelings of hurt, rejection, failure, guilt, a sense of being punished by others, an increase in the constant irritations in life or a loss of self-esteem.

Why a Support Group For Separated and Divorced?

- It takes time to heal.
- There are several stages that occur.
- Support and understanding come from others who have "been there".
- There is comfort in meeting people who have experienced the same type of loss.
- These gatherings offer a safe place to process the trauma of the separation or divorce.
- Often the group becomes the safest and only place for participants to share their feelings
- People recognize the love of Christ through one another.





CHANGES TO MASS

Question:

Why do we make changes in the Mass? Some seem so small and unimportant. Are they really necessary?

Answer:

The celebration of the Eucharist is at the heart of our identity as Catholics. Our purpose as a Church community revolves around the Eucharist. Everything we are and everything we do is measured not only by how well we celebrate, but also by how well we live the sacrament. If that is so, then we as a community will always strive to celebrate the Mass as best we can. The reasons for some changes might seem more obvious than others, but there is a reason behind each one. The General Instruction of the Roman Missal is the introduction to the Missal that contains all the prayers for the celebration of the Mass. The Order of Mass we use now was issued in 1975 and, as often happens over the course of years, some questions have come up about the proper way of doing some things and whether or not other practices are acceptable. These changes clarify some things and make the celebration of the Mass more meaningful for everyone. The opportunity is presented to us to better learn and understand each part of the Mass, which in turn should help us deepen our appreciation for its beauty and meaning. We will be a better Church if we have a clearer understanding and knowledge of Who and what we celebrate.
