

Dear SPA Family,

We Christians look forward to Christmas and the Vigil of the Holy Night, while at the same time we know that this Night has existed for a long time. It was the Night during which the history of the world changed fundamentally. But as is often the case with us, we need time to understand the significance of this event. It is worth asking: who are we waiting for during Advent? Or maybe we don't want to wait, and we could celebrate Christmas almost immediately? Whoever wants to answer this question must make the conversion to which John the Baptist calls us this weekend.



At the center of the second Sunday of Advent is the figure of St. John the Baptist and his teaching about the

Savior. John the Baptist teaches us about the necessity of conversion (metanoia). People need conversion because the kingdom of heaven is near. Conversion must begin with a change of mind. Metanoia means a change in thinking, the way of evaluating and experiencing reality. Conversion creates an opportunity to liberate oneself from one's patterns of thinking, perceiving, and acting, to change the perspective of experiencing oneself and others, to discover new life possibilities, to rebuild one's way of interacting with the world, with other people, with God.

Conversion is making straight paths for the Lord, as John the Baptist says. It is nothing else than to return in our lives to that moment when we followed the straight path in our discernment of reality, in our moral choices, in our words that were evangelical yes, yes; no, no (Matthew 5:37).

Conversion is a specific process of purifying one's life from illusions, appearances, and hypocrisy. As Bishop Fulton Sheen said, "To be a sinner is our misfortune, but to be aware of it is our hope". John the Baptist, calling for conversion, evokes the image of threshing, which consisted first of threshing with flails of grain thrown on the threshing floor. Then they were thrown up with a shovel called a fan, as a result of which the grain fell to the ground, and the light chaff was blown away by the wind. Conversion is supposed to lead to a seed of truth about who we are, what we want, what we feel, how we think, and how it can fall into the soil of our lives.

After all, conversion is cutting yourself off from what doesn't bear fruit in your life. John the Baptist announces an imminent judgment that is supposed to motivate conversion: The ax is already laid to the root of the trees. So every tree that does not bear good fruit is cut down and thrown into the fire (Matthew 3:10). The process of conversion, sticking to the gardening metaphor, is carried out through a kind of 'pruning' of our lives, by cutting off those shoots of our thinking and actions that bear bad fruit.

John the Baptist teaches not only about conversion, but also about the coming of the Savior. John, therefore, does not teach about himself, but announces the Messiah. He is the one who precedes the Messiah. It's a very beautiful picture for us. We also precede the Lord. We go before Him so that through us He can reach people. From time to time in history, careful witnesses of the times have pointed out that the Church is harmed not by her adversaries, but by 'lukewarm' Christians. We should relate to people in such a way as to awaken their longing, so that they wait 'for the Other' - for the One who will satisfy their deepest longings. Advent is a time to rediscover the presence of Christ among us.

GOSPEL MEDITATION



This week we hear that John the Baptist is out in the wilderness eating "locusts and wild honey" (Mark 1:6). It's not just a strange historical detail. It's a symbolic expression of a healthy spiritual diet. The path to Christ includes both the hard and the beautiful, the gritty and the sweet. We have to learn to gulp the locusts and savor the honey.

I remember working with a young couple preparing for marriage. They were sincere, but raw — barely beginning to discover faith. Part of me wanted to rush them ahead, to fill in all the gaps, to bombard them with scripture and church documents. I swallowed that instinct. It was like eating locusts.

But I also recall them light up as they spoke about each other, about their first child, then their second. And they wanted to be close to God. Something innocent and beautiful was unfolding. That was the honey. I knew God was asking me to savor it.

This Advent, maybe we're each being invited to accept both locusts and honey. Maybe it's time to stop avoiding the difficult parts of faith — prayer that feels dry, the call to repentance, the patience with the troublesome. It's time to eat some locusts.

But we also need to notice the small gifts God gives us: a peaceful moment, a good conversation, the joy of serving someone else, new life, good intentions of our friends. That's the honey. Savor it!

John didn't avoid either. He took it all in. And so can we. What are your locusts? Your honey? If we let God feed us with both, we'll be ready — really ready — for the coming of Christ.

John wore clothing made of camel's hair
and had a leather belt around his waist.
His food was locusts and wild honey.
At that time Jerusalem, all Judea,
and the whole region around the Jordan
were going out to him
and were being baptized by him in the Jordan River
as they acknowledged their sins.

When he saw many of the Pharisees and Sadducees coming to his baptism, he said to them, "You brood of vipers! Who warned you to flee from the coming wrath? Produce good fruit as evidence of your repentance. And do not presume to say to yourselves, 'We have Abraham as our father.' For I tell you, God can raise up children to Abraham from these stones. Even now the ax lies at the root of the trees. Therefore every tree that does not bear good fruit will be cut down and thrown into the fire. I am baptizing you with water, for repentance, but the one who is coming after me is mightier than I. I am not worthy to carry his sandals. He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and fire. His winnowing fan is in his hand. He will clear his threshing floor and gather his wheat into his barn,

but the chaff he will burn with unquenchable fire."








We will not be offering the Precious Blood from the 1st Sunday of Advent until Palm Sunday, for health reasons during cold and flu season, to avoid potential virus transmission. A Catholic does not have to receive both the Body and Blood of Christ, as receiving either one is a full reception of the sacrament. Receiving only one form is a valid and common practice, and provides the same graces as receiving both; we receive the entirety of Jesus in the Eucharist.

<u>During the Communion Procession:</u>

- 1. Approach the Priest, Deacon, or Extraordinary Minister of Holy Communion.
- 2. The Sacred Host will be lifted and shown to you, land the Priest, Deacon, or Communion Minister will say, "The Body of Christ". 3. Extend your hands or tongue and say "Amen".
- 4. Whether you receive on the tongue or the hands --DO NOT MOVE -- until the Sacred Host is placed on your tongue or hands.
- 5. PLEASE DO NOT step to the side, but consume the Host immediately in front of the priest, deacon, or Communion Minister.
- 6. Then, you can return to your seat.
- If you do not receive communion and want a blessing, come, cross your hands over your chest to receive the blessing.

Thank you for your understanding and for enhancing Catholic beliefs.



Simbang Gabi is more than a liturgical observance—it's a cultural celebration. In towns across the Philippines, the tradition is marked by parols (star lanterns), festive music, and local delicacies like bibingka and puto bumbong served after Mass. These elements reflect the Filipino spirit of joyful anticipation, hospitality, and resilience.



The practice also became a tool for evangelization. Missionaries used the novena to teach Catholic doctrine while embracing Filipino customs. The Masses were often held outdoors to accommodate large crowds, and the community would gather in celebration afterward.

Here at Saint Paul the Apostle, one way we pass on our faith to the next generation is through our Simbang Gabi—inviting children to participate in the liturgy, music, and traditions that have shaped our identity for centuries. This tradition has endured for centuries, becoming a cornerstone of Filipino identity. Even during colonial restrictions—such as the temporary ban on native-language hymns in the late 1600s—Filipinos found ways to preserve and adapt Simbang Gabi.

"More than just a religious observance, Simbang Gabi is a vibrant expression of Philippine cultural heritage, weaving together faith, community, and historical legacy." (Sinaunang Panahon, 2025)

SAINT

St. Lucy | Feast Day December 13

A name that means "light," St. Lucy (283 – 304) is the patron saint of those blind or suffering with eye trouble. Not much is known about her life, except that she was determined to remain a virgin and thus refused marriage. History tells the story of a frustrated suitor who eventually accused St. Lucy of being a Christian (at crime at the time), and she was executed in Syracuse, Sicily, in the year 304.

Today, we celebrate a number of traditions that incorporate symbolic meaning of St. Lucy as the "bearer" of light in the darkness of winter. This is particularly seen in Scandinavian countries, with their long dark winters. There, a young girl dressed in a white dress and a red sash (as the symbol of martyrdom) carries palms and wears a crown or wreath of candles on her head. In Denmark, Norway and Sweden, girls dressed as Lucy carry rolls and cookies in procession as songs are sung.

Attorneys work with the client to develop a next steps plan to address the problem and provide peace of mind. Training is provided to all attorneys at no charge.


